As the great flood waters from Hurricane Sandy swept into so many of our communities, that ancient advice of "head for HIGHER GROUND", echoed once more. The concept of "heading for higher ground" is referred to in the Bible from the Book of Daniel 4 to St. Paul's reference Pressing Toward the Goal (Philippians 3:12-4:1).

Higher ground represents safety, dry land, a direction closer toward God. So like the other people of faith we have to lead our community to safety and away from the dangerous waters. We pray that our path will be enlightened by God's help.

Prepare for Lent

Dear Beloved:

The Great Lent period is the most significant part of our Orthodox Faith. The first day of Great Lent is Monday, March 18, 2013. Permit me to examine closely the "true" purpose of Lent. Let us, dear brothers and sisters in Christ, turn to our Holy Church Fathers for spiritual guidance.



St. Nectarios of Aegina gives us his spiritual counseling as follows:

"The path of virtue is a path of effort and toil: Straight is the gate, and narrow is the way, leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it; whereas the gate of vice is wide and the way spacious, but lead to perdition." St. Nectarios goes on to say "Fasting is an ordinance of the Church, obliging the Christian to observe it on specific days, especially Holy and Great Lent." Concerning fasting, our Savior teaches: "When thou fastest, anoint thine head, and wash thy face; that thou appear not unto men to fast, but unto thy Father Who is in secret: and thy Father, Who seethe in secret, shall reward thee openly." From what the Savior teaches we learn (a) that fasting is pleasing to God, and (b) that he who fasts for the uplifting of his mind and heart towards God shall be rewarded by God, Who is a most liberal bestower of Divine gifts, for his devotion.

St. Ambrose of Milan also speaks to us in love and gives us guidance:

"We are now entering the most sacred period of the Holy and Great Lent and so you must be me more earnest in Prayer and Alsmgiving, in Fasting and in Spiritual Vigilance...He that till now has given alms, in these days let him give more, for as water quenches a flaming fire, so does almsgiving wipe out sin." (Ecces. 3:33). "He that till now fasted and prayed, let him fast and pray more, for there are certain sins which are not cast out except by prayer and fasting." (Matt17:28)



St. Cosmas Aitolos gives his special guidance and love and tells us "Fast according to your ability, pray according to your ability, give alms according to your ability, and always hold death before the eyes of your mind." The Holy Father tells us Fasting is not mere matter of diet. It is to return to God, to come home like the Prodigal to our Father's House. In the words of St. John Chrysostom, it means "abstinence not only from food but from sins." The fast, he insists, "should be kept not by the mouth alone but also by the eye, the ear, the feet, the hands and all the members of the body: the eye must abstain from impure sights, the ear from malicious gossip, the hands from acts of injustice." St Basil protests, "It is useless to fast from food, protests St. Basil, and yet to indulge in cruel criticism and slander: You do not eat meat, but you devour your brother."

Our response to Lent varies. Some of us are resolved and determined to make a sincere attempt to observe this Holy period. Some will be indifferent and continue to live their lives without any change. Then there are those who simply talk about Lent, about Fasting, and about confession, but never get to the realm of application. Nevertheless, here are some simple things we can do:

- We can begin our day with prayer.
- We can make time in our day to attend to our Bible readings and Bible study.
- We certainly can attend church services more regularly, especially Pre-Sanctified Liturgy.

May our Lord and his Saints guide us all to a very successful and happy Lent season to the great and awesome Holy Resurrection of Christ.

See the World as God's Gift to You

Come and see God's many blessings in your life. What is your response to His gifts? In gratitude and thanksgiving, you offer your time, talents and treasure in proportion to what you have been given. Gregory the Theologian writes, "You will never overcome God's

generosity, even if you give away all that you have.... And however much you bring to him, always more remains. Nor will you give anything that is your own; for all things flow from God (Or 14.22)."

See What the Church can Become

Come and see what the Church can become - not just maintaining current programs, but doing the ministries made possible by your support.

In the early Church, every person brought everything they could spare for the needs of the Church. They provided for the sustenance of the clergy, widows and orphans, for helping the poor, and for all the good works of the Church. This is the Church that we as Orthodox Christians claim to be.

How much can your offering do for Christ? - Only as much as you empower it to do. It depends on your love, because we give to Christ and His Church not according to our means but according to our love for Him. We are called to love God with our entire being - our time, talents and treasure.

See God Work through You

Come and see God work through you to serve His Church and those who seek His Truth.

God will place you in situations to share your faith. As He called upon His disciples on the day of His Ascension, He has also called upon you to be His witness.

We begin by bringing ourselves to Christ. But it doesn't stop there. After we have brought ourselves, we bring

others. The greatest gift we can give to another person is Christ, and the ministries of the Church provide the opportunity to do so. But these ministries require your support.

We are able to fulfill God's mission for the Church only to the extent that we support it. We do this by our physical, spiritual and financial support.

Come and See

This Phrase is simple yet powerful. It calls us to change our location - physically and spiritually. If we want to find Christ, we must move toward Him. We must grow and mature in our faith.

Giving to the Church is an opportunity - an opportunity to examine our priorities and values. It is an opportunity to express our thankfulness, to give of ourselves and to grow in grace. It is an opportunity to participate in the work of God. Come and see what we can do together with your support.

A check mailed to the church is meaningless unless it is accompanied by our presence, by our willingness to serve, by our prayers, and by our commitment. Giving is not a substitute for our commitment - it is an expression of our commitment. Come and see how you can grow through service to the Church.

Come and see the works of God, Who is awesome (Psalm 66:5).

Cheerful Giving

In II Corinthians 9:7 we read "Each person should give what he/she has decided in his/her heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." Consider your weekly expenditures on

entertainment, coffee, etc. Keep in mind that the expenses of the Church increase every year. In order to grow our ministries and meet our expenses, stewardship contributions must also increase each year.

Proportionate Giving

The more we are given, the more that is expected of us. Each steward should determine the percentage of their time, talents and treasure that can be committed to Christ and His Church.



The parable of the prodigal son is known so well that some of its phrases have passed into ordinary spoken language.

This parable, found in chapter 15 of the Gospel according to Luke, stresses forgiveness in the final time. But its themes are inexhaustible. There are too many to count.

The theme of repentance is also present. The gradual, inner process of the sinner's turning towards full repentance, which calls for awareness of his fall, his sincere remorse, and his humble conversion of spirit toward the Heavenly Father.

The younger, prodigal son is all fallen mankind as well as each individual sinner. His portion of goods, his share of the property are, God's gifts to each man. The demand made to the father for the portion of goods falling to the son in order to use it arbitrarily is the striving of man to distance himself from God, to follow his own thoughts and desires. The father's consent to hand over the property depicts the absolute authority with which God has honored man in the use of God's gifts."

Having taken his portion, the younger son departs to a far country, a foreign place of estrangement from God. There he stops thinking of his father and "lives riotously," in a life of sin that alienates him further from the Creator. He quickly squanders his property, his share of God's gifts of mind, heart, and body. His poverty is spiritual desolation. Such a man

does not really control what brings him pleasure. It controls him.

One Church thinker has written: "This far country, this foreign land reveals to us the profound essence of our life, of our condition. Only after having understood this, can we begin the return to real life. He, who has not felt this at least once in his life, who has never realized that he is spiritually in a foreign land, isolated, exiled, will not understand the essence of Christianity.

Remorse and repentance are born out of the experience of alienation from God, from the joy of communion with Him . . . It necessarily includes in itself the profound desire to come back, to return, to find anew the lost home."

Having lost his inheritance, the younger son begins to hunger. To survive, he becomes a pig herder. A saving thought awakens in him: "How many hired servants of my father's have bread enough and to spare, and I perish with hunger!"

The prodigal son had not lost his one remaining gift--memory of his father and his home, which amounts to his conscience (God's voice within us). He understands his terrible situation, resolves to forsake his sins and repent his offences to the Lord. Finally, his humility, repentance, and awareness of his unworthiness bring the sinner back to the father. God allows calamities to sinners to bring them to their senses. They are God's call to repentance.

The parable's father stands for the Heavenly Father. The Father's goodness exceeds all human concepts, in His love for the sinner and His joy when the prodigal son's returns to Him.

The Father has already forgiven and forgotten everything, and he receives the dissolute and starving swineherd as a beloved son. The father does not require proofs of his son's repentance, because he sees that his son has overcome shame and fear to return home. The Father's joy is there because "my son was dead and is alive again; he was lost, and is found." The prodigal son was spiritually dead when he was living without God, and he come back to spiritual life by returning to life in God.

At some time, we all behave like the prodigal son. By our sins, we all alienate ourselves from His love. The service for the Sunday of the Prodigal Son describes our alienation from God: "I have wasted the riches which the Father gave me; I have spent them all and now am destitute."

Salvation begins when you come to know your own divine nature, as the prodigal son did. In one instant he saw that he was a slave to sin in a foreign land without genuine life. After a such self-recognition, a man may contrast himself with God's image in him, however bruised and calloused by habitual sin. Then a man begins to thirst for regeneration from sin and conversion back to being God's image.



SACRED MUSIC CORNER

Are you suffering from post-Christmas music blues? Are you missing visions of sugarplums dancing in March? Not quite Easter but longing for that same moving holiday music?

Take heart! PIOTR ILYITCH TCHAIKOVSKY to the rescue! Yes that most wonderful of composers that brought you the Nutcracker, Swan Lake, 1812 Overture,

symphonies, concertos, operas, ballets and chamber music was a profound composer of liturgical music. Being an Orthodox Christian it is not too surprising that he did indeed compose the music for the Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom. (1878)



Many of these Russian liturgy recordings have been re-recorded in English and are easily recognized by any Orthodox Christian. One such excellent recording is that of the Sacred Treasure Series. Of particular fame worldwide is Tchaikovsky's Cherubim Hymn for Choir.

Despite Tchaikovsky's version of The Divine Liturgy having been approved for correctness by the Moscow office of Sacred Censorship; when the Director of the Imperial Chapel learned of Tchaikovsky having obtained permission for publication, he ordered the police to seize all published scores of the work.

The first performance of the Liturgy was held in the Great Hall of the Moscow Conservatory in 1880. Of that performance Tchaikovsky wrote to his brother, that he received "...a terrific and unexpected ovation together with the presentation of a kind of lyre-shape garland from an anonymous admirer."

While the literature was never accepted by the church in Tchaikovsky's life time, it was performed for the first time in a church in 1893 on the 40th day after the composer's death. After this it was sung on the annual anniversary of the composer's death. His liturgy served as a model for numerous Russian composer's including Tchaikovsky's student Sergei Rachmaninoff.

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
