WHO'S WHO

YANNIS XYLAS (Guest Accompanist) was born and raised in Thessaloniki, Greece. He studied piano with Nikos Astrinidis and received his Diploma with Honors from the Macedonian Conservatory of Music. He has performed extensively in Greece, mainly in concerts for Two Pianos, premiering W.Bolcom's *Recuerdos* in Greece, among other works, a concert that was televised. He was also rehearsal pianist and assistant chorus master for the Lyrical Opera Chorus of Thessaloniki for six years.



He currently resides in New York and has been associated with

Mid-America Productions (American premiere of Theodorakis' s opera *Elektra*, Rossini's *Ermione, Medée* and Taneyev's opera *Agamemnon*) Opera Orchestra of New York, Miller Theatre (US Premiere of *Oresteia* by Xenakis), New York Grand Opera and Lubo Opera (US premiere of Kalman's 1928 Operetta *Die Herzogin von Chicago*) as rehearsal pianist, chorus master and assistant conductor. In 1999 he made his Lincoln Center (Avery Fischer Hall) debut in New York in the triple capacity of performer, orchestrator and artistic director in a concert featuring Greek classical music. In 2002 he appeared at Washington's Kennedy Center in a similar concert, and in April 2010 made his Carnegie Hall debut in the two pianos, percussion and chorus version of *Carmina Burana*.

He has performed extensively in the USA, China, Czech Republic, Greece, Honduras India, Indonesia, Poland and Spain, collaborating with singers, instrumentalists and orchestras, mastering an extensive repertoire of opera, oratorio, operetta, lied and specializing in rarely performed music and Greek Classical music. As an organist he has played the great organs of St. Patrick's Cathedral and St. Bartholomew's.

Mr. Xylas has been the accompanist for the Metropolitan Greek Chorale (NYC) for many years, and is also Vice President of the Hellenic Music Foundation and the Artistic & Music Director of the Hellenic Music Foundation Symphony Orchestra, as well as a conductor and freelance orchestrator.

EPHIGENIA KASTANAS (Soprano) hails from New England where her Greek Eastern Orthodox faith and cultural heritage were cultivated. With these solid religious and family roots, she embarked on her musical journey from church choir member to classical music opera performer, with pivotal roles in the United States, Europe and Canada. Her vocal educational credentials begin with her Bachelor's degree in Vocal Performance from the Hartt School of Music in Connecticut where she graduated *suma cum laude*. With a thirst for expanding her knowledge, craft skills and ability, she auditioned and received a sought-after conservatory position in the Masters program at the Manhattan School of Music in New York, where she distinguished herself and attained her



Masters in Vocal Performance. EphiGenia continues her coaching and vocal instruction, respectively, under Joan Dornemann and Olga Makarina, both acclaimed affiliates of the Metropolitan Opera. She also has used her extensive musical background to give back with voice instruction and coaching to underprivileged children.

EphiGenia was selected and invited to perform three lead roles in Southern France: *Bagatelle* (Bagatelle), *Le Mariage aux Lanternes* (Catherine), and *La Périchole* (Brambilla). While in France, she was an understudy as Antonia in *Les Contes D'Hoffmannb*. EphiGenia has performed in MSM productions of *l'Enfant et les Sortileges* (l'Enfant understudy) and *Die Zauberflöte* (Papagena, Erster Knabe). Some other operatic endeavors include: *Carmen* (Frasquita), *Die Fledermaus* (Adele, Rosalinda), and *Le Nozze di Figaro* (Susanna). More recently, she has toured during the summers with the International Vocal Academy Institute (IVAI) throughout New York and Canada performing such arias as Bizet's *Carmen* and scenes from Menotti's, *Telephone*. She continues to seek opportunities and venues in both classical and cultural vocal performances.



THE ARCADIAN CHORALE was organized in the fall of 1992 with the aim of providing local residents in the Monmouth County, NJ area the opportunity to sing and perform choral music on an advanced level. Acclaimed for its innovative and musically accomplished productions, the group presents two full programs each season at sites throughout central NJ, and serves the community by participating in special events throughout the year.

In June 2001, the Chorale made its **Carnegie Hall debut** in a performance of Beethoven's 9th Symphony, appeared there again in February 2002, singing Mozart's *Coronation Mass*, and made a third trip in November 2002, offering Dvorak's *Te Deum*. It returned there in June 2003, for the NY Premiere of *Ermione*, a recently rediscovered opera by Rossini. Reviews referred to the group as "uniformly solid" and singing "with passion and accuracy." In April 2007, it sang at that august hall once again, offering Poulenc's *Gloria*.

In May 2007, the Chorale sang two performances of the **Verdi** *Requiem* at sites in New York City, in collaboration with the Mannes Community Orchestra, the Richmond Choral Society, and the Metropolitan Greek Chorale. The group reprised that work in May 2008 at Carnegie Hall with the St. Cecelia Chorus and Maestro David Randolph. For Verdi's 200th birthday celebration in Oct. 2013, the group sang his masterwork once again in Manhattan, with the NY Symphonic Arts Ensemble.

In May 2004, the ensemble made its debut at the **NJ Performing Arts Center (NJPAC)**, joining with its "sister chorus," the Richmond Choral Society of Staten Island singing the Mahler Symphony #2, the "Resurrection." The performance celebrated the 30th Anniversary of the "Carnation Revolution," when democracy was peacefully restored to Portugal.

Locally, the Chorale has sung at the **Count Basie Theater** in Red Bank several times, joining forces in 2004 with the Monmouth Symphony in a performance of Orff's *Carmina Burana* and Poulenc's *Gloria*, and again in October 2010, singing Beethoven's *9th Symphony*. The ensemble was honored to participate in both the 35th and 40th Anniversary Gala concerts of the Monmouth Conservatory of Music, collaborating with its director Vladislav Kovalsky as piano soloist in Beethoven's *Choral Fantasy*. In April 2012, the Chorale provided the chorus for a standing ovation performance of **Video Games Live**.

In 2005 & 2006, the Chorale appeared at the **Two River Theater** in Red Bank, selling out the house for its holiday programs. In March 2007, it made its debut in Asbury Park, where it partnered with the Staten Island Philharmonic for "Mozart Plus One," an innovative presentation of Mozart's *Requiem*. The two groups joined forces again in April 2008 for a concert version of Verdi's *La Traviata* at the St. George Theater, Staten Island.

In September 2007, the Chorale performed at Ocean Grove, as part of the **NJ State Opera's "Destination: Opera!"** program. The Chorale has participated in the annual Freehold Holiday Festival, the Freehold/Taster's Choice Summer Concert Series, and "Tomorrow's Brightest Stars," an arts festival sponsored by the National Alliance for Excellence. In addition to its live performances, the group has made several appearances on cable television.

For the occasion of its 10th Anniversary in 2003, the ensemble commissioned *Infanta Marina*, a new work from New York composer William Hawley. For its 20th Anniversary in 2013, the Chorale premiered Seattle composer David Reznick's powerful *The New Jerusalem*. Committed to creating a permanent record of its work, the group has released 14 recordings, including its Spring 2007 performance of the Verdi *Requiem* and Spring 2010 offering, Beethoven's *9th Symphony*.

Saint Demetrios with hymns let us honor Alleluia, alleluia! Praised as a "stand-out" by the New York Times, **CHRISTOPHER LUCIER (Tenor)** is in increasing demand as an operatic and concert artist. He has developed a reputation for his



"large and beautiful lyric voice" which has served him in his professional association with the roles of Giuseppe Verdi and Gaetano Donizetti. To his "wonderfully sung" assumption of II Duca di Mantova in *Rigoletto* at Hubbard Hall, and his "commanding" turn as tenor soloist in Verdi's *Requiem* with the CT Virtuosi Orchestra, he has added the roles of Macduff in *Macbeth*, Alfredo in *La Traviata*, Nemorino in *I'elisir d'amore*, Ernesto in *Don Pasquale* and Fenton in *Falstaff*.

Chris has also come to be associated with new American works, from playing Dickon in the premiere of Nolan Gasser's **Secret Garden** to the central role of Paul in Nancy Van De Vate's **All Quiet on the Western Front**. The Albany Records recording of Lee Hobby's **Summer and Smoke** (in which Chris sang the role of Roger Doremus) was named by Opera News as one of the 10 best Opera Recordings of 2011. He also was featured as Gherardo in **Gianni Schicchi** with Salt Marsh Opera, Sam and Elder Hayes in **Susannah** with Ash Lawn Opera and Pong in Puccini's **Turandot** with Metro Chamber Orchestra. During his long association with Connecticut Lyric Opera Chris has performed Ottavio in **Don Giovanni**, Remendado in **Carmen** and Harlekin in **Der Kaiser von Atlantis**. Chris has also prioritized education, bringing his original, exciting hour of comedy and opera to thousands of students in over 100 performances in his association with Salt Marsh Opera preparing students for their encounters with **The Magic Flute**, **Gianni Schicchi** and **La Cenerentola**.

DONALD BOOS (Baritone) has appeared as a featured artist with many New York and New Jersey music and opera groups including Columbia University Glee Club, Sacred Heart Cathedral Orchestra of Newark, Coro Lirico, Central Jersey Symphony Orchestra, the Choral Arts Society of New Jersey, New Jersey State Opera, Bel Canto Opera, and Dell'Arte Opera Ensemble. He has sung with New Jersey State Opera in a special performance of *La Boheme* as Schaunard, and as Scarpia in *Tosca* and Masetto in *Don Giovanni* for the New Jersey State



Opera Guild. Last year he sang the role of Sharpless in two concert performances of *Madama Butterfly*. In December 2016 he was bass soloist for Handel's *Messiah* with the Civic Chorale of Greater Miami, and in May for Mozart's *Requiem* and Haydn's *Theresienmesse* with the Summit Chorale.

Mr. Boos has appeared in concert (*Carmina Burana*, Bernstein's *Mass*) at Alice Tully Hall in Lincoln Center, at Merkin Concert Hall in New York, and on Robert Sherman's "Listening Room" program on radio station WQXR. He has presented programs at Miami-Dade College, Drew University, and the Graduate Center of the City College of New York. While still a student, he appeared in recital at The New York Cultural Center as a finalist in the New York Singing Teachers Association Young Artist Competition.

Mr. Boos has several musical theater roles to his credit, including Tony in *The Most Happy Fella*, Mr. Peachum in *The Threepenny Opera*, El Gallo in *The Fantastiks*, J. D. Sheldrake in *Promises, Promises*, and Phil Arkin in *Milk & Honey*.

In addition to performing, Mr. Boos has directed *Tosca, Hansel & Gretel, Mademoiselle Modiste, Trial by Jury, Riders to the Sea, Street Scene* and *Down in the Valley,* and served as music director/conductor for several musical comedies including: *Carousel, The Music Man, Li'l Abner, The Boy Friend,* and *The Pajama Game.* His extensive concert soloist experience ranges from Bach's *Saint Matthew Passion* and Beethoven's *9th Symphony* to Prokofiev's *Ivan the Terrible* and Schönberg's *A Survivor from Warsaw.*

Mr Boos will sing the role of Germont in Verdi's *La Traviata* later this month with the Hawthorne Symphony. He will sing the role of Don Carlo in *La Forza del Destino* in concert later this spring, and in June he will be Fiorello in New Jersey State Opera's production of *II Barbiere di Siviglia*.



MARINA ALEXANDER Musical & Artistic Director

Highly regarded for her innovative approach to programming, **Marina Alexander** founded The Arcadian Chorale in 1992, and has since guided its musical and organizational development. Under her leadership, the Chorale has established a reputation for innovative programming and artistic excellence.

In the Spring of 1995, Ms. Alexander was also named Musical Director of the **Richmond Choral Society** in New York City, and presently serves as conductor of that 70 voice ensemble. Leading both choruses, she made her **Carnegie Hall debut** in

November 2002, conducting Dvorak's *Te Deum.* At that same performance, she led the choruses and orchestra in the **World Premiere** of her **orchestration** of Bainton's *And I Saw A New Heaven.* Her ensembles joined forces again in May 2004, making their debut performance at the New Jersey Performing Arts Center (NJPAC) singing Mahler's *Resurrection Symphony.*

In 2004, Ms. Alexander was named Music Director of the **Metropolitan Greek Chorale** in Manhattan, and has performed works from both the Eastern and Western traditions with that ensemble, including premieres of works in the Byzantine style and several of her own compositions.

Known as a scholar and translator, Marina produces many new editions of choral music, including the world premiere of an English singing version of a lost "Ode to Joy" by Tchaikovsky, the 2nd ever performance of that piece in the US. For presentations of Mozart's unfinished *Requiem*, she composed a completion of the "Lacrymosa" in the style of Mozart.

Ms. Alexander is also Adjunct Assistant Professor of Choral Music at the College of Staten Island-CUNY, where she also teaches Conducting and Music History. She leads open sings for her own ensembles, as well as The New York Choral Society, and has appeared at Lincoln Center for the National Choral Council's annual *Messiah Sing.*

Ms. Alexander holds a Masters Degree in Conducting from the **Oberlin Conservatory** of **Music**, where she studied with Dr. Daniel Moe, and was subsequently invited to teach there as Interim Director of the Department of Choral Music. She also earned a BFA in Stage Directing for Opera, and then worked with opera companies and festivals both here and abroad. These include the Santa Fe Opera, New Jersey State Opera, Academy of Vocal Arts in Philadelphia, Lake George Opera, and the Corfu International Music Festival.

An advocate of arts education, Ms. Alexander has served as an adjudicator for the New Jersey Teen Opera Festival, the Monmouth County Arts Council's Teen Arts Festival, and the Sights & Sounds Arts Festival of the Greek Orthodox Churches of NJ. She teaches conducting privately, and often appears as a clinician and guest speaker at choral workshops and music festivals. She is also a founding Board Member and current President of the **NJ Choral Consortium**.

Ms. Alexander has been nominated by Fleet Bank for its **Small Business Leadership Awards**, and been honored by the Business and Professional Women of Staten Island as a "**Woman of Achievement.**" **She** was also chosen by the Daughters of Penelope as their "**2011 Honoree for the Salute to Women,**" as "a woman who is Greek or a Philhellene that has achieved a high level within her profession and is an excellent role model and an inspiration to all, men and women alike."

The Story of ST. DEMETRIOS



Born sometime between 260 and 280 AD, Demetrius came from a noble family secretly practicing Christianity, in the then Roman province of Macedonia, in northern Greece. Through his ancestry and own ability and virtue, he rose to a high military position under Galerius Maximian, Caesar of the Eastern part of the Roman Empire. Despite this position in the still-pagan empire, Demetrius remained fervent in faith and works for Christ, encouraging many Christians to endure persecution and even bringing many pagans to the faith.

When Maximian returned from one of his campaigns to Thessaloniki, which he had made his capital, he had pagan games and sacrifices celebrated for his triumph. Demetrius was denounced by pagans who were envious of his success, and he was imprisoned. While there, he was visited by a young Christian named Nestor, who asked Demetrius for a blessing to engage in single combat with the giant Lyaeus, who was posing as the champion of paganism. Demetrius gave his blessing and Nestor, against all odds, slew his opponent in the arena, as David had once defeated Goliath.

Maximian, enraged and learning that this had occurred with Demetrius's aid, first had Nestor beheaded outside the city, and then had Demetrius run through with spears in prison, in 306 AD. Later Demetrius's servant Lupus was beheaded after using his master's blood-stained tunic and signet ring to work many miracles. The Christians buried Demetrius and Nestor together in the bath house where Demetrius had been confined.

During the seventh century, a miraculous flow of fragrant myrrh was found emanating from his tomb, giving rise to the appellation *Mirovlitis*, the Myrrh-Streamer. The tomb containing his relics is now in the crypt of the Church of St. Demetrius in Thessaloniki. Demetrius is revered as the patron saint of that city, believed as having intervened to save the city over the years from invading foreigners, and subsequently worked many miracles. Demetrius' feast day is October 26, the date of his martyrdom.
