## SATURDAYS OF SOULS

**February 14<sup>th</sup>, 21<sup>st</sup>, & 28<sup>th</sup>**

Saturdays of Souls are special days in the Orthodox for commemorating the dead, praying for their forgiveness and rest, and remembering all departed loved ones.

On each of the Saturdays of Souls we remember the names of our departed family members, relatives, friends and acquaintances by sending their names to the church. Names sent will be read each of the three Saturdays.

It is customary to bring a bowl of kollyva (boiled wheat), or a prosphoro (church bread) to the Divine Liturgy on the Saturday which you attend.

## HOUSE BLESSING 2026

Since no formal announcement was made about house blessings, Father Nick would like to ask anyone who would like their house blessed to call the Parish Office. Father will then schedule a time and date during the last two weeks of February.

### Make Your Heart Like The Heart of the Publican

The ministry of Jesus had as its goal to transform people's hearts in order to help them gain entry into His Kingdom. His life, death, and resurrection ushered in a completely new way of relating to God: the way of grace. One of the best examples of Jesus shifting paradigms comes in His parable of the Publican (Tax Collector) and the Pharisee, found in Luke 18:10-14:

"Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people—robbers, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.' But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.'

'I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For all those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted.'

It is time to open our hearts and allow the Spirit to guide us to live life more like the tax collector than the Pharisee. Let's allow Him to lead us to a life lived in the new covenant of grace. This is why our Holy Orthodox Church has placed this Parable at the beginning of the Triodion. It is the first lesson for us as we prepare for the Great Lenten Season each year.

In the time of Jesus, God's people were completely starved for relationship with Him. Judaism had become a religion of regulations, a legalistic theology, rather than relationship. God's people believed that their lives were totally based on their works, placing the religious Pharisees at the top of the totem pole stretching up to God. The Pharisees believed they were justified before God because of their works, as if they could earn their way into right standing with God.

So, imagine the shock of Jesus' listeners when He says that the tax collector, the most hated of all Jews, went home justified before the Lord as the result of his humility. Imagine the shock and anger of the Pharisees in learning that all they had worked for, all the rules and regulations they had lived by, actually placed them lower in stature than any other Jew in the sight of God.

The Parable of the Publican and the Pharisee offers mind-blowing news for each of us. The principle Jesus teaches here in Luke 18 is that the greatest attitude of our heart is one of humility, not perfection. The way to God is not one of works, but of grace. Jesus teaches that whatever weakness we have, whatever sin we struggle with, all God asks of us is that we come before Him and ask for His mercy. All He requires of us is a repentant heart.

You see, the Lord is always after your heart. All the works of the Pharisees were born out of their own pride. In their egotism they thought they could earn the right-relationship with the one, true, and holy God. All of their religious deeds were done not out of their love for God, but out of their love for their own status.

However, the Publican had nothing to boast about. He lived his life robbing his own people to fill the pockets of the Romans who enslaved them. He was made wealthy by stealing from his own people. But in his desperation he cried out to God for help, and God heard his cry.

Let us all understand that God hears our cries today when they come out of the reality of our need for Him. He answers our need for forgiveness and right-relationship with the overwhelming power of His presence. So, we must ask ourselves today, what do we value most? Do we value our own status or God's opinion? Are we living in light of God's grace or trying to

earn it? Are we going through the motions of religion in order to earn our way into the right-relationship with God, or are we living in response to the wealth of love we have freely received in Christ?

Wherever we are, understand that it is never too late to come before our Heavenly Father in humility. It is never too late to repent of any area in which pride has been our motivation and decide to live our lives on the foundation of grace. Christ came to usher in the path of grace, not of works. He came so that we might live in His strength, not our own. The price of His mercy is a humble heart. A very important lesson is that humility is the key that unlocks the depths of our souls to receive the free gift of His grace. If we will just cry out to Him and ask Him for His mercy for our sins and His love to satisfy our needs, He will fill our lives with the gift of His unending presence.

At the beginning of this year's Pre-Lenten season, let us form our hearts to be like that of the Publican every time that we pray. Let us follow his example of humility and then we will find the places in our hearts which need the blessing of God's love.


